

PROOF TO PROCURE LAND CERTIFICATE,

To persons who have been permanently disabled by reason of wounds received while in actual service of the State or of the Confederate states, by virtue of an act of the 17th Legislature, approved April 9, 1881.

This blank is furnished by J. H. Collett, Austin, Texas. I have a different blank for widow of soldier.

BEFORE the Commissioners' Court of the county aforesaid personally appeared to us well known, who, being first duly sworn, says:

1. That he was a *bona fide* resident of this State, at the date of the passage of this law, and is now a resident citizen of this State and was a resident of this State when he enlisted in the military service of the Confederate States in the late war between the States of the United States. 2. And while in actual service was permanently disabled by reason of wounds, received in such military service, so as to seriously impair his ability to perform bodily labor, or earn a living for himself and family. 3. And that he has not property of the value of one thousand dollars.

Also at the same time before us personally came J. A. Rempus and J. R. Bishop credible persons, and to us well known, who, being duly sworn, depose and say that they know W. H. Frost the first affiant, and that he is the identical person he represents himself to be, and that the facts stated by him are true, and that he is entitled to a land certificate under the provisions of said act.
